As of 2015 Hadley has received over 400 American Orchid Society awards; these include 15 FCC'S (First Class Certificate's) and 6 AQ'S (Award of Quality) from AOS. He has won both W.W. Wilson Award and Merritt W. Huntington Award (Best Paphiopedilum and Best FCC of the year). In May 2015, Hadley received the highest distinction of his career...he was awarded AOS Award for Excellence in Hybridizing. This award is given for a lifelong commitment to hybridizing excellence.

I was born in Toledo and raised in Perrysburg, Ohio. I attended Wittenberg University in Springfield, Ohio and received a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration.

I met and married Eldon in Midland, MI where I lived after graduation and worked for Dow Chemical Company. Eldon is a graduate of University of Michigan and taught biology classes at Delta College until he retired.

We have two sons, Kyle and Brook. Among them they have two girls and one boy. Kyle is an epidemiologist and Brook is a computer engineer.

Eldon had a colleague who moved from Michigan to California. She had a Phalaenopsis orchid that she could not take with her so she gave it to us. It bloomed repeatedly and I was hooked! Grow the best for me in our sunroom or on window sills, I guess those are my favorite. I enjoy attending orchid shows and seeing orchids grow 'in the wild'.
