Member Profile Sally Heinlein

I grew up in Frankenmuth on a farm. We always had large vegetable and flower gardens. I was the main one taking care of them. By ten I probably had 3 dozen plants in my bedroom. I started going to college and then stopped after 2 year (got my associate in science), because I decided to get married. I worked at Meijer's in the bakery for a short time, then at Bay Med for 5 yrs. and quit six months after we had our first child.



(Eventually we ended up with 2 daughters and one son. Both daughters are married and I have two grandsons, Jeffrey, who is 6 yrs. old and Luke who was born in mid Aug. 2 ½ months early, but doing great).

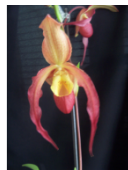
My husband and I always have had a large garden and then we saw an ad for a blueberry farm. So my husband decided why don't we do something like that, so I can stay home with our kid (s). So in 1986 we bought 10 acres and in the fall planted 3 acres of raspberries. The following spring we planted one acre of blueberries and ½ acre of asparagus, and had our home built on the land (while we lived in a house trailer there). In June 1990, we had 60mph winds and living on sand it blew for miles. The neighbors sand blew on our land and in so doing, the roundup and other sprays they used, killed off the south half of the raspberries. So then we started strawberries. In our peak of business we had asparagus, strawberries, blueberries, summer raspberries, 2 acres of sweet corn, fall raspberries, and wholesaled over 20 ton of pumpkins. The past couple years, a new bug (spotted wing drosophila) invaded us (been in the U.S. for 10 years on the west coast), due to importing products from other

countries. So my husband decided to end our berry business this fall. Our daughter and son in law decided to keep the strawberries and this past spring we planted 3,000 plants for next year. So now I need to go and look for a job, doesn't sound like any fun to me? We had our business 31 years.

As for my addiction to orchids, it is all my husband's fault. Being engaged, one has to pick out a wedding bouquet. I saw a bouquet of a dozen large, white Phals and that is what I got. I was addicted. Within a year, I had my first white Phal. I never repotted it. It bloomed great for me, until we lived in a house trailer (with no air conditioning) and that summer was 85-95 degree daily and it took a toll on my plant and died.

As you all know that didn't stop me. I found more orchids to buy. Then in 2009 we had a lean-to greenhouse built. Three years ago I crossed some plants for the first time. I first crossed 2 denidrobiums (the plants are now 1-4" high, then I've crossed a couple Phrags.

(they are still in the lab and she thinks they died and no hope for them after 1 ½ yrs.), a couple of cats, and this past spring I crossed my awarded RI. Digbyana (made 5 crosses and only 2 survived and those pods should be ripe to send to a lab in 2-3 months). I now also have a light rack in a room to grow babies. A couple of years ago Marilyn and I took on the task of deflasking some together. What stories we could tell. We have now a much better success rate and think we figured out what works for us. As for how many orchids I have? I can't say, too many to count, especially if you count all the babies and future babies to come. I enjoy growing Phrag. the best, since I can set most of them in a saucer of water and leave them alone until the water is gone. I'm still trying to figure out why a lot of them won't bloom and trying different ideas. I hope to figure it out one day and have hundreds of blooms.
